What are Operating Standards?

- ICANN Bylaws call for Operating Standards for Specific Reviews that "shall be developed through community consultation" (<u>Section</u> <u>4.6</u>).
- Purpose: Provide consistency, clarity & transparency by documenting rules/procedures around ICANN's four specific reviews:
 - Competition, Consumer Trust, and Consumer Choice Review (CCT)
 - Security, Stability, and Resiliency of the DNS Review (SSR)
 - Accountability and Transparency Review (ATRT)
 - Registration Directory Service Review
- Informed by community input
 - ICANN57, ICANN58, ICANN60
 - Webinars (Feb 2017, Oct 2017)
 - Public comment period (Oct 2017-Feb 2018)

- Discussions at ICANN61
- Post-ICANN61: Two-phased approach to update current draft
 - MSSI will formulate options to inform community discussion based on public comments
 - Issue-focused, open calls with the community
- Fully-revised draft of Operating Standards will be published for public comment



Participation in scope setting

<u>Concern</u>: Need effective and efficient opportunity for review team members to participate.

Continuity

<u>Concern</u>: Need continuity of membership between Scope Drafting and Review Team members.

Modification

<u>Concern</u>: Need efficient and timely method to modify scope once review has commenced.

Suggestions:

- Review Team to determine scope
- Add time to process to facilitate scoping activity
- Give multistakeholder community opportunity to comment on proposed scope



Suggestion:

Need appropriate framework to deal with exceptional situations where members of the community and/or Board wish to raise concerns about significant aspects of a review after that review has started.



Role of ICANN

<u>Concern</u>:

- No description of ICANN Board role in Bylaws with exception of Board representative on RT and action on final recommendations.
- No provision in Operating Standards that articulates a role for ICANN or Board to suspend or disrupt a review.

Leadership of ICANN SO/ACs

<u>**Concern</u>**: Suggestion that discussions with SO/AC leaders are a sufficient work method of community consultation misunderstands the role and purpose of those in these leadership positions.</u>

Suggestions:

- ICANN and community consider how best to articulate role of ICANN and Board.
- Role of ICANN and Board remain limited to ensure impartiality on matters pertaining to actions of ICANN in the reviews.



GAC Comments - Administrative Overload

<u>Concern</u>: Administrative burden associated with process especially in early stages of a review (terms of reference, scope, conflict of interest statements, progress tracking tables). Negative impact on commitment and engagement.

Facilitation

Suggestion: 'At review team's discretion whether another member of the Team or an ICANN Staff Support facilitator is better placed to chair one, several or most meetings and calls.'

Reporting

Concern: 'Reporting possibility under 3.16 is insufficient if only based on "publicly available information". Nominating SO/ACs may need to be involved in making decisions on the position to take in the Review Team; a Review Team member thus needs to be able to provide the necessary level of detail on current discussions to enable this decision-making process.'



Highlights of Community Input

Scope of work

- No support for scope being set by designated scope team review team should set own scope.
- Concerns about role of Board in formally approving scope.
- Support for Board providing feedback on the Terms of Reference, including scope.

Review team selection

- Support for establishing a minimum number of review team members, even if it means three or more members from some SO/ACs, none from others.
- Volunteers not affiliated with SO/AC should still be eligible for review team selection.

Monitoring of review progress

- Include clear designation of authority, grounded in Bylaws, should a review team fail to function effectively.
- Clarify role of Board in review process including when it can intervene and how.



Highlights of Community Input (continued)

Approval/maintenance of Operating Standards

• Provide clarity on scope of Operating Standards (when applicable, who can adopt, if adoption is mandatory).

Timing of reviews

• Overall timing of reviews to be revisited/adjusted.



Scope of the review

- Review team develops the scope, gathers input from the community, validation by the Board that within Bylaws? Other ideas?
- Call for volunteer selection criteria determined before scope is set and timing of review is formalized how to bridge the gap?


Timing of reviews
