Hello and welcome to the ICANN82 GAC Opening Plenary Session on Saturday, 8th of March at 18:30 UTC. So, with that, can we go to the-- Gulten, can we go back? There we go. So, I already talked about this, but just in case it was not clear,



these are some notable agenda highlights the community forum, the meeting format, the GAC priority policy topic sessions, the New gTLD Next Round issues. I already talked about this, the DNS Abuse, registration data, etc.

There is an icon on Zoom toolbar that says Interpretation under More tab. You may click on this icon in order to select the language of your choice from the menu. We have six UN languages and Portuguese available. To view the real-time transcription, you may click on the Show Caption button in the Zoom toolbar. Links to scribes have been shared on the calendar invitations, which were sent out last week.

During the sessions, please remember to sign into Zoom platform using your full name. There's a rename function available on Zoom participants' section. It is possible to do that by hovering over your name on attendee list. Present here in Seattle or joining us remotely, all attendees should raise hand via Zoom. That would help our chair, Nico, to manage the queue.

A couple of notes for our in-person attendees. Seats at the tables with microphones are only for GAC delegation members. Other community members are welcome to join the GAC sessions, but we would much appreciate if you can take the seats on the back of the room and leaving the seats on the tables to GAC community members. Seats will be reserved in the front rows for some sessions including the joint meetings with ICANN Board, GNSO, ALAC, and circulation of written materials in GAC room is not allowed.

Moving to health and safety protocols. Mask wearing while indoors is by your choice and enhanced venue cleaning is still being found very crucial so there are relatively long breaks between the sessions. What I wanted to share with you is a little bit of information that we have already talked about during the agenda-setting calls to set you up and prepare for the meeting. The GAC leadership under Nico's direction has had a clear focus for the last year or so on improving metric collections, data information, and being able to share that information with all of you, not only to help gear up and improve engagement throughout the committee, but also to be able to give you the accurate information for you to share with your colleagues and with others.

One of the components of that work has been an overhaul of our membership records. Many of you have now had interactions with Barry Cobb. Barry is in the back of the room today again, who's really helped us in terms of identifying and helping keep up all the information with respect to delegations. So, thanks for all of you

who have contributed to that effort through your follow-up and work.

An aspect of that is the attendance at meetings. appreciate you all making that effort, and we hope that that will improve things. Again, Nico, just another step along the line and more rigor from a record keeping and engagement perspective.

Thank you very much. And that brings us to the end of the tour de table. Anybody who didn't have the chance to introduce himself or herself in the room? I don't see any hand up. And as far as I can see online, everybody had the chance to do the introductions. So, with that, let's move on to the next slide, please. Yeah. Thank you.

As I mentioned before, we're welcoming at this point 60 new GAC delegates since ICANN81 in Istanbul. That's a surprising number, as a matter of fact. 60 new GAC representatives. We have a new GAC member, Monaco, and also, we're welcoming the African Parliamentary Network on Internet Governance, APNIC. I hope I'm pronouncing the name well. Who's a new GAC observer. So that makes up 184 members and 40 observers.

So, at this point, it's actually time to say thank you to the departing distinguished GAC vice chairs, Zeina Bou Harb from Lebanon, Nigel Hickson from the United Kingdom, and Wang Lang from China. So, let's give them a big round of applause. Thank you so much. You will be missed for sure, especially during the planning sessions. And even more especially during the Communiqué drafting and reading, given the Shakespearean experience my good friend Nigel has in that regard.

Also, a big round of applause for Ian Sheldon from Australia, Jorge Cancio from Switzerland, and Marco Hogewoning. I hope I'm pronouncing your last name well. My apologies beforehand. But anyways, Marco Hogewoning from the Netherlands. A big round of applause for them as well. So those are the most notable GAC transitions so far. So, at this point, Rob, I don't know if you would



like to speak a little bit about some GAC activities, or we'll give the floor to Fabien at this point. Or I can do it myself. No problems, no problems.

So, thank you all GAC representatives and delegates for your active engagement since ICANN81, since Istanbul, and all the interesting conversations and the emails and everything else. We have had so far four formal GAC public comments, seven formal letters on various topics. We're going to get to the details later.

Engagement with ICANN Board regarding 11 issues of importance, those 11 issues of importance coming from our Istanbul meeting to governments, three agenda setting and preparatory calls for ICANN82 for this meeting. We'll try to make it shorter next time. We'll see if we can do it in two intersessional calls, that would be ideal. But if we can't, for whatever reason, we'll try to maintain then the three preparatory calls that is for Prague for ICANN83. Let's see how it goes. If we can do it in two calls, we'll have to do it in three.

There's been engagement with ICANN Board and GNSO regarding urgent requests, as you may know, for disclosure of registration data. And we're basically ensuring that regular reporting on ICANN org outreach and the status of the ASP, the Applicant Support Program is provided on a regular basis. And there's been also active cross-community engagement on WSIS+20 preparations. And thank you again to Zeina, to Christine and to Ana for preparing that session, which happened about three weeks ago, not even a month ago, right? So, thank you so much for that.

This year, as everybody knows, it's going to be very active in terms of WSIS+20 discussions. There's all kinds of news coming like on an everyday basis. GAC representatives, as far as I know, are going to do their best in order to be in Norway for the IGF as well in June. I believe it's from the 23rd to the 27th. Please correct me if I'm wrong, but I think it's 23rd to the 27th of June. So, lots of news, lots of activities going on in parallel.

Let's move on to the next slide, please, Gulten. So, in terms of Communiqué development, at this point, I will have the pleasure of handling the floor to my good friend, Fabien Betremieux. By the way, congratulations for the victory this morning against Ireland in rugby. Very good game. I think it was what, 43-27? 42-27? Sorry, Ireland, no offense. But it was a very good game. So, congratulations to you as well. Fabien, all yours.

FABIEN BETREMIEUX

Thank you, Nico. So, this is the usual slide for most of you. You're probably quite familiar with the process now, but I think there's value in going through this slide and explaining the process for those of you that may be new to the GAC. We've seen that a number of participants have joined the GAC since 1981.

So, the Communiqué, the GAC Communiqué, as you may be aware, is one of the key outcomes of an ICANN meeting for the GAC. And this is where the GAC formulates its potential advice to the ICANN Board, as well as its position on issues of importance. So those are two key sections of the GAC Communiqué, which are the subject of this drafting effort. The entire Communiqué is drafted in as a



committee, but those two sections and some other parts of the Communiqué are particular areas that are discussed in session, in plenary session, amongst the GAC.

And so, this is what you see at the top of this slide. You may recall from emails you have received from the GAC chair in the last two weeks that prior to an ICANN meeting, the committee is invited to share topics of interest and potential key messages or potential text of GAC advice in advance for consideration by the community, not as a replacement in any way of deliberations during the meeting, but more as an opportunity to start discussions as necessary.

Now that we've entered the meeting week, we're going to go through this process of, so today is the introduction, recalling the process. And from now on, during each plenary session, the organizers of the sessions, the topic leads, the GAC topic leads are invited to ensure that there is time in each of the sessions to potentially identify need or intention to suggest Communiqué text and to have some initial discussion, which also enables GAC members to identify who may be pen holders for those portion of text that may be proposed in the Communiqué. So, consideration of the Communiqué starts now and throughout each of the sessions until we reach those drafting sessions, the first of which is going to be on Tuesday. There will be then two or three on Wednesday, I'm not sure, and then two on Thursday.

The idea of spreading the Communiqué drafting sessions across several days during the week is to enable participants to potentially



communicate with their capitals across time zones overnight, et cetera, to ensure that there can be, there is time for this as opposed to spending an entire day that may be completely off hours in some time zone on the Communiqué drafting and without the ability to consult if necessary with capitals. We're spreading the drafting effort through over several days. And it also enables potential conversations in between sessions among participants that are interested in contributing to various pieces of text in the Communiqué. So, this is why you see those blue arrows there spreading the effort.

And on the last Communiqué session, we go through a final review of the entire Communiqué to ensure that everybody present agrees with the text. And once this is done, once the Communiqué text is drafted and adopted in session, we go through 72-hour Communiqué review period, which is an additional step that was born out of the COVID experience and the virtual meetings then to ensure that not only there was an additional opportunity for those GAC members that were prevented to participate because of time zone issues. That's also a potential way to address language barriers and other logistical barriers.

And so, the purpose of that review period is for all the GAC members to review the text and ensure that there is no substantive issue with the text. This is not for discussing variation of text. This is really to identify if there is an issue that would necessitate to not publish the Communiqué, reconvene and discuss this issue.

And so, you will receive at the end of the week with the Communiqué text that was adopted in session, an email explaining the modalities of that review period, which again is not for rediscussing text. It's really for flagging a serious issue that merits reconvening the GAC. And there's not been a precedent of such an issue. So, it sounds like Communiqué text has always been appropriate and I've gone through this review period without change. And so, we wish that it will be the case this time as well.

Now on the second half of the slide here, the bottom half, this is addressing how contributions to the text work. We provide a Google document, the link to which we will share again after this session or maybe if my colleagues are able to circulate that. So, you'll receive a reminder. You've already received it from the GAC chair in the previous emails of the last two weeks, but we will share it again. We ask you not to share this link in chat or in any public forums to avoid any interference in the process. And so, this document is the tool we use to allow you to share text directly in the document. And so, you are invited at any time to do that during the meeting.

There will be a point at which the GAC chair will propose a deadline for initial contributions, after which we will only be collaborating through GAC support staff. And that's to avoid some frictions we've experienced in some times with changes that were not expected or that happened after some adoption of some parts of the text. And so, this is to facilitate the process, give you the maximum

opportunities to edit the document until we reach a near final place where we ask that you go through us for final edits.

And also at any time, please feel free to reach out to us, the GAC support team, to help with any research of precedent with practices of how certain topics are addressed or where in the Communiqué. We are also available if you would like us to help you with ensuring the accuracy of references in text you propose. And again, consistency with the usual practice, we try to make sure that the Communiqué is consistent in the way it addresses, in the way it's formatted, in the way it addresses issues so that the audience of the Communiqué, which is the ICANN Board and the entire ICANN community, can expect to find the information that they usually look for in the Communiqué where it usually is. And with that, I think I've covered what I think was most important to say, Mr. Chair.

NICOLAS CABALLERO

Thank you so much, Fabien. So once again, very quickly today, tomorrow and Monday, well, days 1 through 3, we enter the Communiqué process intro and plenary sessions phase. So, to say, Tuesday, which is Day 4, consideration in sessions, plus the first drafting, as you can see, I'm just reviewing.

Wednesday, plenary sessions and Communiqué drafting sessions 2 to 4. And there, we stop right there and that's why you see that stop sign there saying, pre-agreed deadline for initial text contribution.



I'm not going to repeat everything that Fabien has already read, but just in case making sure we're on the same page.

Please I would like to emphasize the last part of his presentation in terms of using the GAC support team as a resource. This is very important to research precedent, to ensure accuracy and references, and mainly consistency with GAC usual practice as regarding what we've been doing for the last 25 years, as a matter of fact, I remember, yeah, 26 this year, if I'm not mistaken. 26, right? Was it 1999? When was the first? Correct me if I'm wrong, but I think, yeah, it's going to be 26 years this year. So, thank you again, Fabien. Any questions, anything you would like to clarify, anything that is not completely clear for anybody? I think this is very self-explanatory again.

In terms of consistency and usual practice, we mean that everything that is discussed during GAC plenary sessions will be included in the Communiqué, right? Just to give an example, let's say Portugal doesn't agree with the deployment of DNS, it's just an example, right, DNSSEC, which is not the case, but it's just an example, but we did talk about DNSSEC during GAC plenary sessions.

We had opinions from 20, 30 or 45 countries and that will be reflected in the GAC Communiqué, even though Portugal doesn't agree with the deployment of DNSSEC. I'm just giving a ridiculous example so that we're all on the same page. That is obviously not the case, Portugal, and my apologies for that. It was used just as an example. I'm talking about procedural issues so that we're all on



the same page. I hope this is for the benefit of all participant countries.

I'll stop here and see if we have any reactions, any comments online or in the room. And as a matter of fact, yes, I was right, it's 26 years because the first GAC meeting was in March 1999. So, my memory is working well, which is good, right? So, at this point, we don't need to artificially extend the session. I'll give you five extra minutes for coffee. We were supposed to stop at 2:15 p.m. Enjoy local coffee. I also understand that Starbucks was actually started right here in Seattle, right? So, I like Seattle very much. Jimi Hendrix, the architect. We're going to have a 30-minute coffee break. Please be back at 3:00 p.m. sharp. Thank you. Enjoy your coffee.
